COURSE OBJECTIVES

ISSUES SPECIFIC TO COURSE

- Remember this course has a Provincial Diploma Exam worth 30% of your final mark. It is difficult to know precisely what will be examined in any given year, so every concept in the course must be covered in the time provided.

Expectations:
